In many instances, the Siena/Francis House makes the difference between life and death.

Whatever the case – and due to the overwhelming need – the Siena/Francis House will provide over 53,000 nights of shelter in 2009, up from 128,800 in 2008. They also anticipate that they will serve over 383,000 meals in 2009, up from 326,800 meals served in 2008. And, as has been the case for many years, the Siena/Francis House serves

more meals and provides more nights of shelter to homeless men, women and children than any other charitable organization in the State of Nebraska.

So, yes, it's clear that the recent economic instability has forced many of these persons to become homeless for the first time in their lives.

They provide medical help, meals and shelter. They also help with edu-

cation and job training.
